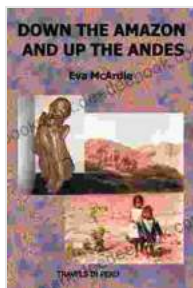


# Down the Amazon and Up the Andes: An Unforgettable Adventure

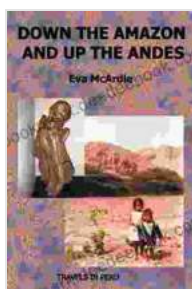
