Backstitch

Satin Stitch

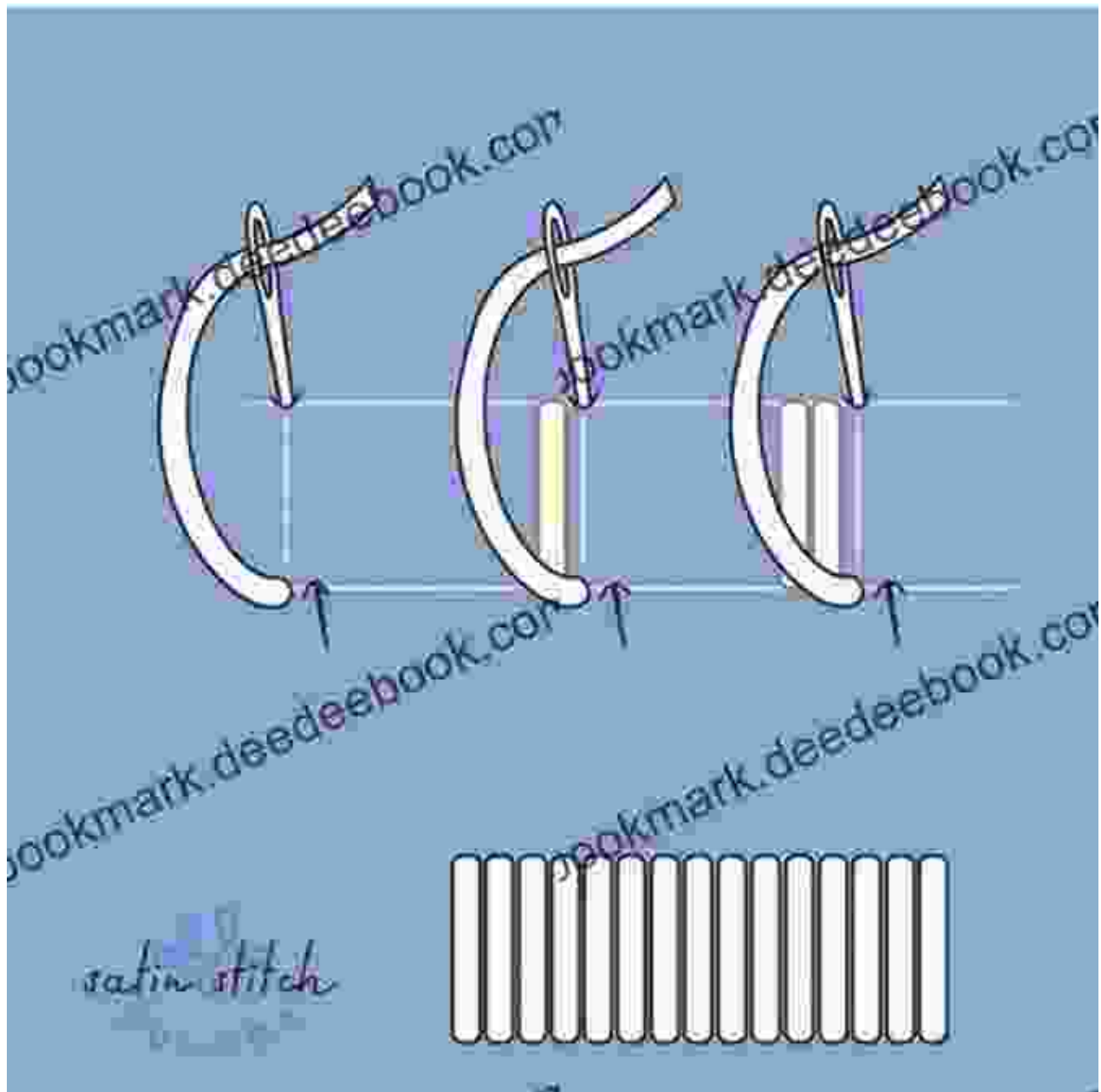
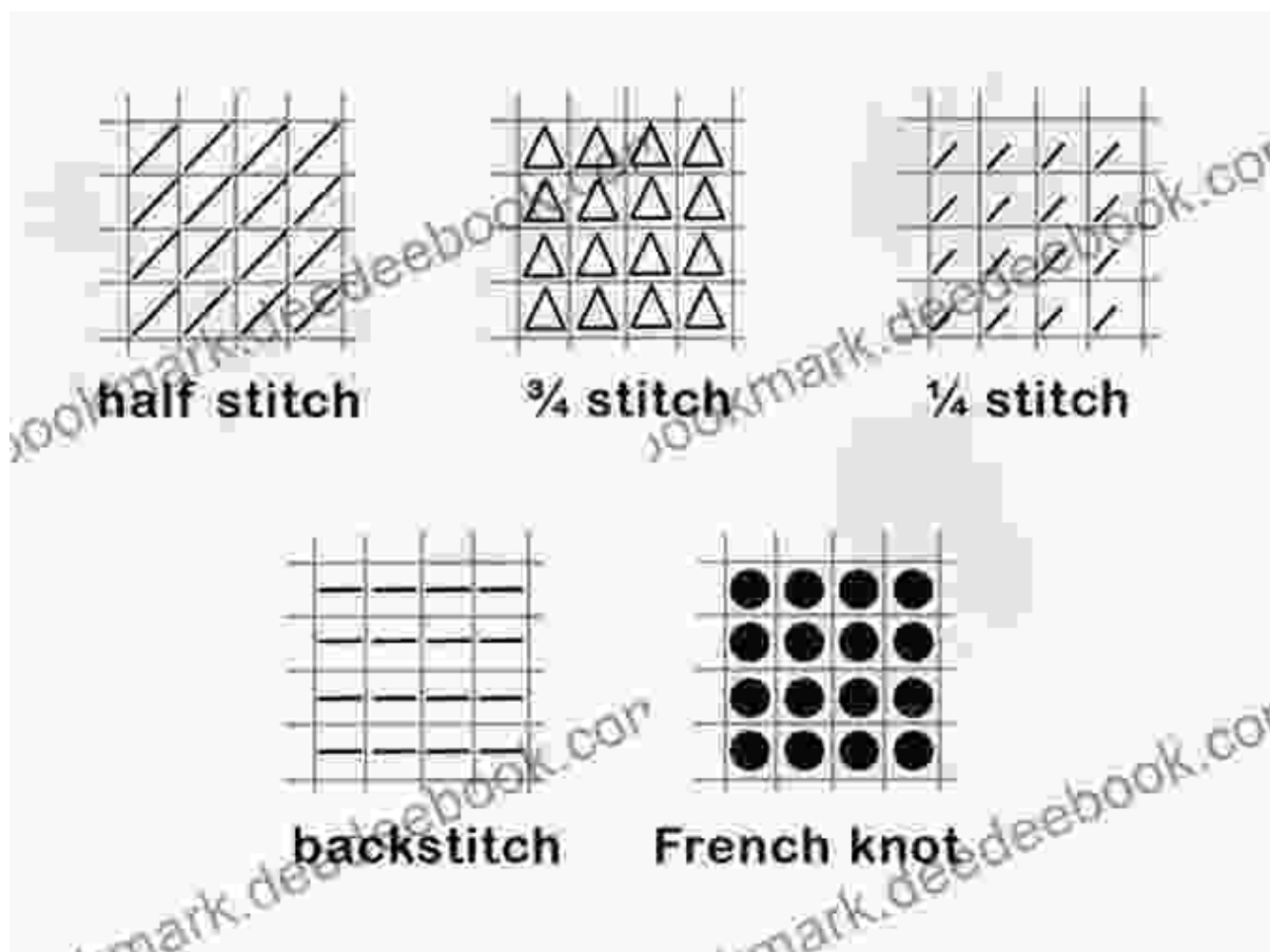


Fig. 4: Satin stitch

French Knot

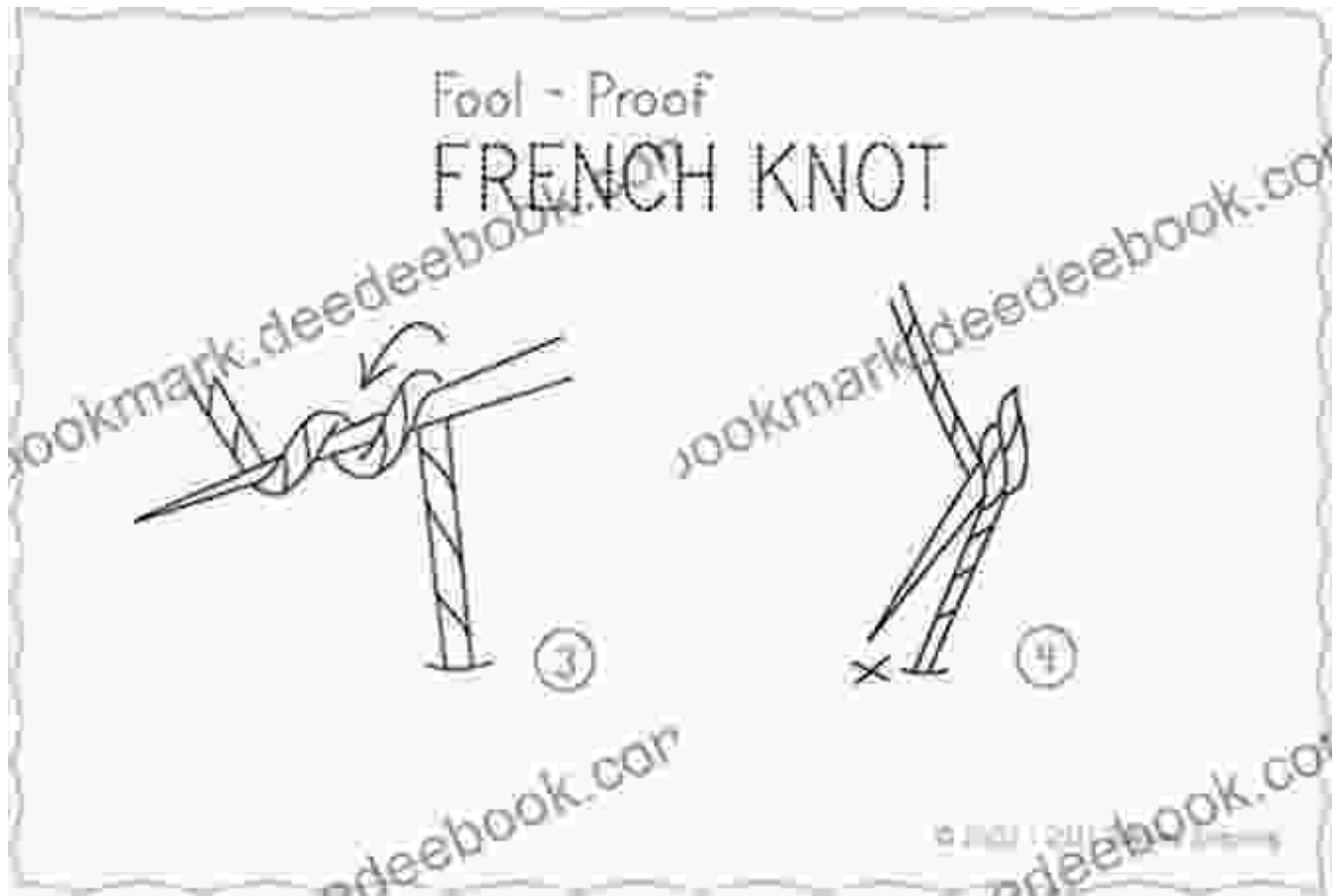


Fig. 6: French knot
