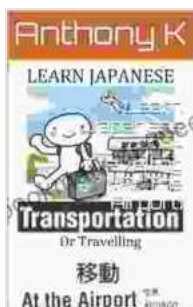

- **I would like to check in two bags.**> 荷物を2つ預けたいです。 >  
Nimotsu o futatsu azuketai desu.

- **Is there a weight limit for checked baggage?**> 受託手荷物の重量制限はありますか？ > Uketokutegashi no jūryō seigen wa arimasu ka?

## **Security Check**

Once you have checked in, you will need to go through security. This is where you will have your bags screened and your body patted down. The following phrases will help you get through security:

- **Please remove your shoes.**> 靴を脱いでください。 > Kutsu o nugide kudasai.

- **Please put your bags on the conveyor belt.**> 荷物をコンベアベルトに乗せてください。 > Nimotsu o konbeāberuto ni nosete kudasai.
- **Please step through the metal detector.**> 金属探知機をくぐってください。 > Kinzokutankichi o kugutte kudasai.
- **Please raise your arms.**> 手を上げてください。 > Te o agete kudasai.
- **Please open your bag.**> バッグを開けてください。 > Baggu o akete kudasai.

## **Boarding Your Flight**

Once you have cleared security, you will be able to proceed to your gate. The following phrases will help you board your flight:

- **Where is gate [number]?**> [番号]番ゲートはどこですか？ > [Bangō]ban gēto wa doko desu ka?
- **When is boarding for [flight number]?**> [便名]の搭乗はいつですか？ > [Binmei] no tōjō wa itsu desu ka?
- **I'm looking for seat [number].**> [番号]番の席を探しています。 > [Bangō]ban no seki o sagashite imasu.
- **Excuse me, could you help me find my seat?**> すみません、席を見つけるのを手伝っていただけませんか？ > Sumimasen, seki o mitsukeru no o tetsudatte itadake masen ka?
- **Can I put my bag in the overhead bin?**> 荷物を上の棚に置いてもいいですか？ > Nimotsu o ue no tana ni oite mo ii desu ka?

## In-Flight

Once you are on the plane, you may need to ask for something from the flight attendant. The following phrases will help you get what you need:

- **Excuse me, could I have a drink?**> すみません、飲み物が欲しいのですが。 > Sumimasen, nomimono ga hoshii no desu ga.

- **Excuse me, could I have a blanket?**> すみません、毛布が欲しいのですが。 > Sumimasen, mōfu ga hoshii no desu ga.

- **Excuse me, could I have a pillow?**> すみません、枕が欲しいのですが。 > Sumimasen, makura ga hoshii no desu ga.

- **Excuse me, could I have some more water?**> すみません、水をもう少しください。 > Sumimasen, mizu o mō sukoshi kudasai.

- **Excuse me, where is the toilet?**> すみません、トイレはどこですか？ > Sumimasen, toire wa doko desu ka?

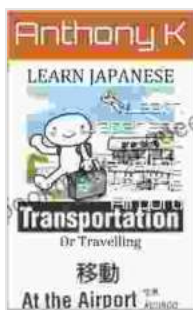
## Tips For Learning Japanese
